Capi Mykenna DIED EARLY TODA

Captain William McKenna, aged 75 years, died Friday morning at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. E. H. Morgan, 3504 Armstrong evenue, Highland Park.

Captain McKenna was born in Bennington, V., in 1839. He was living in Pittsfield, Mass., at the beginning of the Civil War, and was one of the first to respond to the call for volunteers, enlisting first in the Allen Guards, later in the Thirty-First Massachusetts, serving three years. He was with General Butler in the expedition which captured New Orleans and in the reorganization of troops in 1863, was made captain. During most of his time of service he was stationed at Fort Pike, La. In 1865 he was on de-tached duty as inspector, and during this time served as a member of a court martial at New Orleans. He was mustered out in November, 1865, but did not return to the North, preferring

to remain in the South. In 1870 Captain McKanna went to Shreveport as assistant assessor of in-ternal revenue, and soon after was appointed postmaster at Shreveport, relieving C. W. Keating, in which capac-ity he served from 1873 to 1886. Captain McKenna had three commissions signed by General Grant. In 1878 while at Shreveport he was married to Miss Katherine Maroney, sister of the late James Monorey of this city.
